IT/COMPUTER TRAINING COURSES (EASTER TERM 2002)

The Computing Service offers the following IT training courses which are free for current students and staff of the University. Most courses start at 14.15 and end by 17.00 and are held at the New Museums Site, but there are exceptions so please check times and venues when registering. Some are entirely practical, while others take the form of a lecture and demonstration followed by a practical session, and a few consist of a lecture only. 'Self-teach' modules are also available (see below). A printed timetable giving times and locations, and a booklet containing course descriptions may be obtained from Computing Service Reception; this information is also provided on the Web (www.cam.ac.uk/cs/courses/). Only the most popular courses are held at this time of year; there will be a few further courses in July (bookable from June) after which the next full programme will be in the Michaelmas Term, starting in early October 2002. Note that the Computing Service also provides documentation on many topics in the form of handouts, information sheets and leaflets (see Web page www.cam.ac.uk/cs/docs/ or request a copy of handout H9 *Publications Available*).

It is essential to register, preferably by completing the Web form at www.cam.ac.uk/cs/courses/ or, if this is not possible, one of the following methods of booking may be used: e-mail to course-admin@ucs.cam.ac.uk, tel. (3)34662 or in person at Computing Service Reception, New Museums Site, Pembroke Street. Bookings will be confirmed automatically and reminders sent a couple of days beforehand providing a valid e-mail address is supplied. A standby system is used for oversubscribed courses: priority will be given to those who have booked in advance and arrive in good time. If unable to attend for any reason, please cancel bookings giving as much notice as possible so that someone else may take the place, and to avoid waste of resources such as excess copies of printed notes.

It should be noted that, unless otherwise indicated, all courses assume basic computing skills; only those marked "novice friendly" are suitable for those with no previous experience.

Self-Teach Computer Training Courses

In addition to the programme of formal courses, a selection of self-paced training material is provided for loan, or in some cases purchase, from Computing Service Reception, New Museums Site, Pembroke Street. Modules on offer at the time of going to press are listed below, but new ones are added from time to time. As well as duplicating topics covered on the taught courses, for the benefit of those who cannot attend or who prefer this method of learning, they cover other subjects and also more advanced levels. It is advisable to ring (3)34600 to check availability beforehand. A deposit of £50 is required for courses which are borrowed; this usually takes the form of a cheque which is returned when the material is brought back on time and in good, fully usable condition. In most cases it is necessary for the modules to be used on a computer with the correct version of the software installed; in some but not all cases Computing Service facilities may be used. As with most commercial software, there are licence restrictions which forbid copying of courseware, unless expressly permitted. Chemical Engineering Tripos

A course of directed reading in the Long Vacation will be provided for prospective candidates for Chemical Engineering, Part IIA who, having obtained honours in a subject other than Chemical Engineering Part I, are seeking leave of the Chemical Engineering Syndicate to read Chemical Engineering Part IIA.

Computer Science Tripos, Part II (General)

Students intending to read for the Computer Science Tripos, Part II (General) from October 2002 are required to attend a course in Computer Programming in Java given by Dr F. H. KING. The course will begin at 9 a.m. in the Hopkinson Lecture Room on the New Museums Site, on Monday, 15 July, and will end on Friday, 26 July. The course consists of lectures, demonstrations, and practical work.

- ii) Students who have not taken Part IA of the Law Tripos should attend the Legal System and Legal Method and Law lectures in the Long Vacation course given by the Law Faculty. A timetable of this course will be available nearer the beginning of the course from the Law Faculty.

Law

The Faculty of Law will give a course in the Long Vacation for candidates intending to take Part IB of the Law Tripos in the Easter Term 2003, and who have not previously read law. The course will run from 3 October – 5 October 2002. Full details will be provided nearer the time.

Students taking Part III in 2002–2003 will be expected to submit to the Examiners a report carried out on approved work performed either during the Long Vacation in 2000 or during the Long Vacation in 2002. The topic of the report may be either a project carried out in a research, development or other approved establishment in industry or elsewhere, or a project carried out in a Department. Advice and assistance in finding Industrial or similar experience will be available through the Department. For those Part IIA students and Part III students unable to obtain a suitable industry placement, arrangements will be made for them to carry out a project in the Department during the Long Vacation period of residence, starting at 9.30 a.m. on Monday 8 July 2002.

Pathology. Professor WYLLIE's notice.

Candidates who intend to read Pathology for Part II of the Natural Sciences Tripos 2002–2003 should note that the course is organised as an option system, with students taking two options out of four (Cellular and Genetic Pathology, Immunology, Microbial and Parasitic Disease, Virology).
