## Grace for submission to the Regent House under Statute A, VIII, 7

13 June 2011

The Council has considered the following Grace which has been initiated under Statute A, VIII, 7 by 149 members of the Regent House:

That, in the light of sweeping cuts to the HE budget, the trebling of tuition fees, and incoherent access policies, all decided on without adequate consultation, *the University shall communicate to HM Government, by June 24, 2011* or as soon as possible thereafter, *that it has no confidence in the policies of the Minister of State for Universities and Science*, and that this duty be delegated to the Council.

A list of the signatories appeared in the *Reporter* on 8 June (p. 904).

The Council has agreed to submit the Grace to the Regent House (Grace 3, p. 943) to be approved by ballot according to the timetable set out below. In adopting this course of action, the Council was mindful of the presumption that initiated Graces should be submitted other than on very rare occasions (*Reporter*, 1992–93, p. 773), and that the nature of the Grace in all probability would have prompted 25 or more members of the Regent House to request a ballot. In calling for the ballot itself, the Council wishes to ensure that all members of the Regent House have an opportunity to express their view by a vote on the Grace to a timetable that is as swift as the University's legislation on ballots allows.

The Council wishes to reaffirm the principles, which it believes should characterize and inform the funding of higher education, expressed in its 'Statement on the Funding of Higher Education and Student Support' of 8 December 2010 (<http://www.cam.ac.uk/univ/notices/funding-of-he.html>). In particular, it draws attention to the following extract from that Statement:

- There are strong arguments for a significant degree of public funding for higher education teaching and research, reflecting the public benefit which higher education delivers over and above the benefit to individual recipients of a university education.
- The cost of undergraduate education should continue to be borne by
  - Government in the form of a subject-weighted grant per student;
  - students and their families in the form of an annual tuition fee;
  - the University in the form of bursaries to individuals and support for delivery of courses from endowment or other income.

In addition, the Council notes that the Government is expected to publish its White Paper on Higher Education shortly. The Council will wish to ensure that, through a process of effective consultation with the Regent House, it is able to submit a considered response to the proposals in the White Paper that takes account of the full range of views of members of the Regent House and which would be published within the University.

## **Report of the Council on the financial position and budget of the University, recommending allocations from the Chest for 2011–12: Notice in response to Discussion remarks**

13 June 2011

The Council has received the remarks made at the Discussion of this Report on 31 May 2011 (p. 928). With regard to the remarks made by Professor Dodgson about the numbers of staff in the different categories, it notes that the data in Appendix 4 of the Report (p. 777) shows that the balance of expenditure between Schools and other academic institutions and Other institutions and activities has remained almost constant over the period examined. The table that appears in Appendix 1 (p. 774) gives a broad view of the categories of the University's staff, but they need careful interpretation and the Council has agreed that, if possible, more detail will be provided in future years.

The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 1, p. 943) to the Regent House for the approval of the recommendations in the Report.

## **Report of the Council seeking authority to submit a planning application for University land at North West Cambridge: Notice in response to Discussion remarks**

13 June 2011

The Council has received the remarks made at the Discussion of this Report on 31 May 2011 (p. 927). It notes the remarks made by Professor Sanders in support of the North West Cambridge project.

In response to the remarks made by Dr de Lacey, the Council recognizes that part of the site falls within the Parish of Girton as evidenced by past presentations to the Parish Council. A further presentation as requested by the Parish Council has been arranged. Town planning discussions, including section 106 Agreement requirements, for the area concerned are being conducted with South Cambridgeshire District Council as well as Cambridge City Council, and for appropriate areas of responsibility with Cambridgeshire County Council as is the legal requirement. It is expected that the local authorities will consider the views of the parish councils. It is anticipated that draft Heads of Terms for the section 106 Agreement will be submitted with the draft planning application and will include proposed commitments that will benefit the development and mitigate its impact, as provided for under adopted planning policy. Discussions with the County Council include issues relating to the impact of the

development proposals on local roads including Huntingdon Road, although the speed limit on that road is a matter for the County Council based on overall traffic management considerations and does not relate directly to the proposed development.

The provision of off-site facilities on the NIAB site has been proposed by the local authorities as a means of meeting the requirements of both sites. Shared library facilities and provision of a secondary school and a children's centre will be provided on the NIAB site and a Police touchdown facility will be provided on the North West Cambridge site; balancing financial payments will be provided for through the section 106 Agreement. The possibility of late or non-provision of the secondary school on the NIAB site has been raised with the County Council as the education authority and it has advised that it would meet its statutory obligations through existing school sites in the event of that eventuality.

Sustainability is central to the proposed project, with homes being built to Sustainable Homes Code Level 5 from the outset and Code Level 6 by 2016, and with all other buildings to BREEAM Excellent standards. These standards accord with the Government's current definition of 'Zero Carbon'. Leading sustainability consultants AECOM SDG are advising on sustainability matters, with a Sustainability Panel of eminent University experts, chaired by Professor Robert Mair, providing an on-going critique of proposals.

## REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATIONS

### Examination in Translational Medicine and Therapeutics for the M.Phil. Degree

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 531)

The General Board and the Board of Graduate Studies have approved a recommendation from the Degree Committee for the Faculties of Clinical Medicine and Veterinary Medicine that the Examination in Translational Medicine and Therapeutics for the M.Phil. Degree be replaced by an examination in the subject Clinical Science as both a full-time one-year course and as a two-year part-time course **with effect from 1 October 2011**.

The special regulations for the examination in Translational Medicine and Therapeutics have accordingly been rescinded with effect from 1 October 2012.

### Examination in Clinical Science for the M.Phil. Degree

On the recommendation of the Degree Committee for the Faculties of Clinical Medicine and Veterinary Medicine, the General Board and the Board of Graduate Studies have approved Clinical Science as a subject for advanced study for the M.Phil. Degree as both a full-time one-year course and as a two-year part-time course **with effect from 1 October 2011**.

The Board of Graduate Studies are satisfied that suitable arrangements are in place to enable part-time students to have sufficient access to teaching and other resources. The Board are also satisfied that the part-time course is comparable to the full-time version in content, intended learning outcomes, the teaching and other resources available, and forms of assessment. The Council of the School of Clinical Medicine has confirmed that the proposal is consistent with the School's strategic plans, both in respect of the objectives of the School and in terms of any implications for student numbers.

Special regulations for the examination in the subject have been approved as follows:

#### CLINICAL SCIENCE

1. The scheme of examination for the one-year full-time or two-year part-time course of study in Clinical Science for the degree of Master of Philosophy shall consist of:

- (a) a thesis not exceeding 15,000 words in length, including footnotes but excluding tables, appendices, and bibliography, on a subject approved by the Degree Committee for the Faculties of Clinical Medicine and Veterinary Medicine;
- (b) two written examinations which may cover all core subjects prescribed in the syllabus.

2. Each candidate shall pursue research training in one of the themes approved from time to time by the Board of Graduate Studies on the recommendation of the Degree Committee.<sup>1</sup>

3. The examination may include, at the discretion of the Examiners, an oral examination on the thesis and on the general field of knowledge within which it falls, and on the other work submitted by the candidate under Regulation 1.

## Engineering Tripos, Parts IIA and IIB modules, 2011–12: Corrections

Certain of the details in the Notice concerning Parts IIA and IIB modules published on 26 May 2011 (*Reporter*, p. 848) were incorrect.

## History of Art Tripos, Parts IIA and IIB, 2011–12: Special subjects

The Faculty Board of Architecture and History of Art give notice of a change to the special subjects previously announced in *Reporter*, 2009–10, p. 984, for the History of Art Tripos, 2011–12; namely that *Gothic art and architecture in France 1100–1300* is replaced as Paper 5/6 by the following:

### **Paper 5/6. *Art and Architecture of the Italian city 1100–1350***

This Special Subject explores the art and architecture of the Italian city in a period of urban expansion, governmental, and religious change, and growing civic and artistic self-awareness. The course concentrates on central and northern Italy, examining Rome and the Papal States alongside the city communes to the north, and asking how indigenous traditions and differing political circumstances interacted with shared urban characteristics and the movement of artists between cities. Tracing developments in architecture, sculpture, mosaic, fresco, and panel painting, it examines workshop practices and the issue of individual artistic identity, with reference to contemporary documents and to historiography from Vasari onwards. The course considers how artists and architects drew on the classical and early Christian heritage of the cities concerned, but were also informed by Byzantine art and by the development of the Gothic style in northern Europe. Paying attention to the cityscape as a whole, the course addresses ways in which art and architecture served to depict the city and to articulate civic religion, private and communal interests, relationships between city and countryside, and references to the earthly and heavenly Jerusalem.

The Board are satisfied that no student's preparation for the examination in 2012 will be adversely affected by this change.

**GRACES****Graces submitted to the Regent House on 15 June 2011**

The Council submits the following Graces to the Regent House. Graces 1 and 2, unless they are withdrawn or a ballot is requested in accordance with the regulations for Graces of the Regent House (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 107), will be deemed to have been approved at 4 p.m. on Friday, 24 June 2011. In accordance with the provisions of Regulation 7 of the regulations for Graces of the Regent House (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 108), the Council has determined that a vote shall be taken by ballot on Grace 3.

**1.** That the recommendations in paragraph 52 of the Report of the Council, dated 16 May 2011, on the financial position and budget of the University, recommending allocations from the Chest for 2011–12 (*Reporter*, 2010–11, p. 764) be approved.<sup>1</sup>

**2.** That the recommendations in paragraph 29 of the Report of the Council, dated 16 May 2011, seeking authority to submit a planning application for University land at North West Cambridge (*Reporter*, 2010–11, p. 760) be approved.<sup>2</sup>

**3.** That, in the light of sweeping cuts to the HE budget, the trebling of tuition fees, and incoherent access policies, all decided on without adequate consultation, ***the University shall communicate to HM Government, by June 24, 2011*** or as soon as possible thereafter, ***that it has no confidence in the policies of the Minister of State for Universities and Science***, and that this duty be delegated to the Council.<sup>3</sup>
