Advice and assistance in finding industrial or similar experience will be available through the Department. Forthose Part IIA students and Part III students unable to obtain a suitable industrial placement, arrangements will be made for them to carry out a project in the Department during the Long Vacation period of residence, starting at 9.30 a.m. on Monday, 5 July 1999.

#### Pathology. Professor WYLLIE'S notice.

Candidates who intend to read Pathology for Part II of the Natural Sciences Tripos 1999–2000 should meet in the Department of Pathology on Monday, 5 July 1999, at 10 a.m. On that day arrangements will be made for candidates to meet Professor Ferguson-Smith, the organisers of the course options and supervisors of the research projects.
