Notice of a benefaction

23 July 2026

The Vice-Chancellor gives notice that she has accepted with gratitude a benefaction from Cambridge in America, payable over three years, following a donation from Dr Mark Hayter, as endowment to support research and education in the Department of Computer Science and Technology, including by endowing an EDSAC Professorship of Computer Science for a single tenure. The Council, on the recommendation of the General Board, is submitting Graces for the approval of the establishment of the Professorship and the related endowment fund (see the General Board's Notice, p. 686, and Graces 1 and 6, pp. 692 and 693).

Vice-Chancellor's deputies appointed with authority to accept benefactions

23 July 2026

The Vice-Chancellor gives notice of changes to the delegations of authority for the acceptance of donations with effect from 1 August 2026. From that date, the Vice-Chancellor has appointed the following, in accordance with Statute C III 7(b), to act on her behalf until further notice in relation to the acceptance of benefactions,¹ subject to the limitations noted below.

The following have authority to accept donations of up to and including £100k for the benefit of their respective institutions or for the benefit of a centre or institute under the supervision of their institution:

The Librarian

The Director of the Fitzwilliam Museum

The Director of the Botanic Garden

The Director of the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology

The Director of the Scott Polar Research Institute

The Chairs of the various Faculty Boards

The Heads of the Departments listed in Regulation 3 of the General Board Regulations for Departments and Heads of Departments (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 608)

The Directors of other institutions independent of any Faculty or Department but under the supervision of the General Board

The Heads of the Schools

The Director of University Information Services

The following have authority to accept donations of up to and including £4m:

The Executive Director of Cambridge University Development and Alumni Relations (CUDAR)

The Senior Director of Advancement Services of CUDAR

The purpose of the donation acceptance procedures is to ensure that the University can continue to accept philanthropic gifts efficiently while maintaining appropriate oversight and due diligence controls. These changes have been prompted by a review of those procedures. Since the current framework was introduced 15 years ago, philanthropic income has increased substantially, and current processes are no longer well aligned with the volume and complexity of donations now being handled by the University. The amendments to existing delegations:

- retain the £100k limit for the acceptance of donations by heads of institutions but with the cumulative threshold removed;
- raise the threshold for the acceptance of donations by the Executive Director of CUDAR to £4m and extend that delegation to include the Senior Director of Advancement Services of CUDAR.

The revised delegations will reduce the number of lower-value gifts requiring acceptance by the Vice-Chancellor, which will allow the Vice-Chancellor's involvement to focus on the most significant or sensitive gifts, while ensuring that donors continue to receive appropriate recognition (the Vice-Chancellor will continue to send letters thanking donors for their support). The changes are also expected to shorten settlement times and reduce administrative burden while retaining appropriate legal, governance and due diligence safeguards, providing benefits for both the University and donors.

¹ The power of the University to accept benefactions is delegated to the Vice-Chancellor; see Regulation 6 of the regulations for the Vice-Chancellor, *Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 690.

The Procedures for Handling Donations, as referenced in Chapter 14 of the University's Financial Procedures, will be updated to reflect these revised delegations.

Acceptance of all benefactions will continue to be considered in accordance with the ethical guidelines published by the Council (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 1054). Other related procedures remain unchanged, including the establishment of endowment funds of £100k or more by Grace.

Report of the Council on changes to the senior administrative offices: Notice in response to Discussion remarks

23 July 2026

The Council has received the remarks made on the above Report at the Discussion on 14 July 2026 (*Reporter*, 2025–26: 6831, p. 583; 6834, p. 676).¹

Dr Rutter notes the proposed changes to enable the Council and the General Board to allocate any duty of the Registry, the Academic Secretary, or the Chief Operating Officer (COO) to a postholder. He suggests that 'it is difficult to see why the duties, and presumably responsibilities, of some of the most senior roles in the University should be assigned to non-officers', stating that officers 'are given substantial protection by Statute which not only protects their academic freedom, but also gives them the independence to be able to discharge duties without fear of coercion'. The review of the Employer Justified Retirement Age has cast doubt on the legitimacy of extending those statutory protections to academic-related officers, a subject to which the Council expects to return in due course. The Council refers to its previous response to a similar comment on its consultation report on these proposals, in which it noted that the University's Statutes already give the Council the ability to fill an unestablished post of Acting Registry² during a vacancy in the substantive office and its wish to have the flexibility to choose the right person to undertake a duty normally assigned to the Registry (or to the Academic Secretary or the COO) based on their skills and experience rather than on the terms under which they are employed. However, it accepts that this matter is not central to the main recommendations of this Report and therefore it has revised Recommendation I and paragraph (a) of Annex A of the Report to remove these proposed amendments, as set out below.

In his remarks, Mr Haynes suggests that 'it does not look like these options will help reduce the overall budget concerns, except perhaps as an aspirational potential that all the new posts (COO, Deputy, Assistant, etc.) will somehow pay for themselves in the savings they can generate'. The Council has not claimed that these proposals will generate savings in the short term nor pay for themselves over time, though there may be opportunities for savings in the future from the injection of new ideas. The primary purpose of these changes is to redistribute the current duties of the Registry and the Chief Financial Officer to create two more coherent and manageable roles. The changes will also enable the Council to recruit from an existing pool of candidates with experience of similar roles.

Mr Haynes suggests alternative models for the placement of University Information Services (UIS) within the University's reporting structures, including creation of 'a properly resourced Academic Team' or merger with the University Library. The Council notes that both of these models have been tried in the University but ultimately rejected following reviews, with UIS formed following the merger of teams focused on academic and administrative systems, and with the activities of the Centre for Applied Research in Educational Technologies (CARET) transferred from the University Library to UIS in 2015. There is more to be gained from bringing teams together than creating new divisions.

Mr Haynes refers to the 'substantial yet controversial nature of these proposed major changes, and the time of year in which they are being pursued', and anticipates an intention to put the Report's proposals to a vote. The Council notes the strong support from Professor Philpott, Dr Glover and previous commentators for the plans to recruit a COO and to have three senior administrative officers reporting to the Council (Registry and COO) and the General Board (Academic Secretary) through the Vice-Chancellor. It also notes that most contributors who considered the position of UIS during the consultation and at the Discussion of the Topic of concern were supportive of UIS joining other professional services focused on facilitating teaching and research within the remit of the COO as part of the Unified Administrative Service and did not favour a suspension of those plans until work to develop a digital strategy is complete. It therefore sees no need to seek a vote on these matters. The Council agrees with Mr Odgers (echoing similar comments from Dr Glover and Professor Philpott) that it is important to move ahead with the recruitment of a COO who can coordinate the key professional services teams, given the pressing need to operate more efficiently and effectively.

The Council has amended paragraph (c) of Annex A to clarify the separate elements of the Report's recommendations, as set out below.

The Council is submitting Graces (Graces 2 and 3, p. 693) for the approval of the recommendations of this Report, as revised by this Notice.

The Report's revised recommendations

New or revised text is underlined to highlight the changes.

Revised text of Recommendation I:

- I. That the Statutes of the University be amended as follows, and that these amendments be submitted to His Majesty in Council for approval.

By amending Statute C VI (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 20) to read as follows:

THE REGISTRARY

1. Provision shall be made by Special Ordinance for the appointment of the Registry, for the determination of the duties and responsibilities of the holder of that office and for the appointment of an Acting Registry during a vacancy in that office.

2. There shall be under the direction of the Council administrative officers in categories determined by Ordinance. So far as the Council may allow or direct, any duty of the Registry may be performed by such an officer.

Revised text of paragraphs (a) and (c) of Annex A:

- (a) By amending Special Ordinance C (iv) (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 79) to read as follows:

THE REGISTRARY, CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER AND ACADEMIC SECRETARY (SPECIAL ORDINANCE UNDER STATUTE C VI)

1. (a) The Registry and the Chief Operating Officer shall be appointed by the Council and placed under its direction through the Vice-Chancellor.

(b) The Academic Secretary shall be appointed by the Council after consultation with the General Board and placed under the direction of the General Board through the Vice-Chancellor.

(c) None of the holders of the offices of Registry, Chief Operating Officer and Academic Secretary shall be a member of the Council or the Board of Scrutiny.

2. (a) So far as the Council may allow or direct, any duty of the Chief Operating Officer may be performed by an officer.

(b) So far as the General Board may allow or direct, any duty of the Academic Secretary may be performed by an officer.

3. During a vacancy in the office of Registry (or Academic Secretary or Chief Operating Officer), the Council may appoint an Acting Registry (or Acting Academic Secretary or Acting Chief Operating Officer, as the case may be) upon such terms of remuneration as it thinks fit.

4. It shall be the duty of the Registry

- (a) to act as the principal governance officer of the University, and the head of the University's administrative staff supporting governance, legal affairs and policy;
- (b) to keep a record of the proceedings of the University, and to attend for that purpose all Congregations of the Regent House and such other public proceedings of the University as may be specified by Statute or Ordinance or by the Council;
- (c) to act as Secretary to the Council;
- (d) to receive reports of Boards, Syndicates, and other bodies, and to deal with them as required by Statute or Ordinance;
- (e) to be responsible for maintaining a register of members of the University, and keeping records of matriculations and class-lists, and of degrees, diplomas, and other qualifications;
- (f) to edit *Statutes and Ordinances* and the *Cambridge University Reporter*;
- (g) to issue such certificates as may be required in accordance with Statute A II 8;
- (h) to witness the affixing of the Common Seal, or appoint deputies to do so, and to carry out related duties as set out in Statute A II 13(c);
- (i) to issue such certificates as may be required in accordance with Statute J 11;
- (j) to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Statute or Ordinance or by the Council.

5. It shall be the duty of the Chief Operating Officer

- (a) to act as the principal operations officer of the University, and the head of the University's administrative staff supporting other operations not within the remit of the Academic Secretary under Section 6(a);
- (b) to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Statute or Ordinance or by the Council.

6. It shall be the duty of the Academic Secretary

- (a) to act as the principal academic planning officer of the University, and the head of the University's administrative staff supporting academic planning and education and research operations;
- (b) to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Statute or Ordinance or by the General Board.

(c) In the Ordinance for the Unified Administrative Service (staff of the University Offices) (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 693)

- (i) by amending Regulations 1, 2, 3, 6(c) and 7(a) to read as follows and retaining existing footnotes:

1. The staff of the University Offices shall form a Unified Administrative Service which shall be under the supervision of the Council and shall comprise the following Divisions split between (i) Operations, (ii) Academic Planning and Related Operations, and (iii) Governance and Legal:

Operations

- Estates Division
- Finance Division
- Health, Safety, and Regulated Facilities Division
- Human Resources Division
- Investment Oversight and Appraisal Office

Academic Planning and Related Operations

- Academic Division

Governance and Legal

- Governance and Compliance Division
- Legal Services Division

2. (a) Under the provisions of Special Ordinance C (iv), within the Unified Administrative Service the head of Operations shall be the Chief Operating Officer, the head of Academic Planning and Related Operations shall be the Academic Secretary, and the head of Governance and Legal shall be the Registry.

(b) Under the direction of the Council, the Chief Operating Officer, the Academic Secretary and the Registry shall manage their staff within University Offices and their staffing, funding, space, and other resources provided to the Offices by the Council. It shall be the duty of the Chief Operating Officer, the Academic Secretary and the Registry to ensure that arrangements for the quality assurance of the services provided by the Offices are presented to the Council and are implemented as agreed by the Council. The Chief Operating Officer, the Academic Secretary and the Registry shall make such reports on the work of the University Offices to the Council as that body may require.

(c) The Chief Operating Officer, or a University officer appointed by the Chief Operating Officer, shall be the Establishment Licence Holder for facilities regulated by the Animals (Scientific Procedures) Act 1986.

3. With the exception of the Academic Division, within each Division of the Unified Administrative Service there shall be the University office of Director (or such other title as may be determined from time to time by the Council) who shall be head of the Division and whose duties shall include the management of the Division, under the overall responsibility of the Registry or the Chief Operating Officer.

- [6.] (i) the Chief Operating Officer if the appointment is in an Operations Division, the Academic Secretary if the appointment is in the Academic Division or the Registry if the appointment is in a Governance and Legal Division (or a deputy appointed by the relevant officer);
- (ii) the Director of the Division in which the appointment is to be made (except where it is the Director of the Division who is to be appointed or reappointed);

[7.] (a) Appointments and reappointments to the offices of Director, Deputy Director, Assistant Director, Principal Assistant Registry, Principal Assistant Operating Officer, Principal Assistant Planning Officer, Principal Assistant Treasurer, Senior Assistant Registry, Senior Assistant Operating Officer, Senior Assistant Planning Officer and Senior Assistant Treasurer shall be made by the Standing Appointments Committee on the recommendation of an Appointing Committee, the membership of which shall be approved by the Chair of the Standing Appointments Committee, which shall consist of the Registry if the appointment is in a Governance and Legal Division, or the Academic Secretary if the appointment is in an Academic Planning and Related Operations Division, or the Chief Operating Officer if the appointment is in an Operations Division (or a deputy appointed by the relevant officer), the Director of the Division in which the appointment is to be made, an appropriate senior academic-related officer, a senior academic with experience and interest in what the role of the office entails, and a member of the Standing Appointments Committee in class (b).

(ii) by inserting 'Information Services Division' in the list of Divisions in Regulation 1 under the heading for 'Operations';

(iii) in Regulations 4 and 8 by inserting ', Assistant Operating Officer, Assistant Planning Officer' after 'Assistant Registry', in Regulation 8 by inserting ', Academic Secretary and Chief Operating Officer' after 'the Registry', and in Regulation 11 by inserting ', Academic Secretary and Chief Operating Officer' after 'the Registry' in two locations.

Work to improve access to the Sedgwick Building

23 July 2026

The Sedgwick Building on the Downing site is one of two principal buildings used by students and staff in the Department of Earth Sciences; it also hosts the Sedgwick Museum of Earth Sciences, which is visited by 85,000 members of the public each year, and 2,000 children on organised school trips.

Access to and vertical transportation within the Sedgwick Building is very poor. The existing lift serving the Department is not adequate for an average-sized wheelchair or mobility scooter; unreliable when in service; and out of service for long periods, with the consequence that students and staff with accessibility needs may be unable to access teaching, library and laboratory facilities on the upper floors of the building.

The Sedgwick Museum is located on the first floor and is accessed principally from the grand Bison and Bear staircase. Those requiring assistance must use the lift described in the previous paragraph, which for visitors is difficult to locate within the Department of Earth Sciences. Anyone needing to use the lift must call for assistance via an external intercom to access to the ground floor lobby area and – with a member of staff in attendance – travel through the student common room to the lift. Once visitors access the first floor there are two further platform lifts to access the change of floor heights within the gallery areas.

The Sedgwick Building is Grade II listed and in the heart of Cambridge's central conservation area. Substantial and extended engagement, dialogue and negotiation with the Conservation and Planning teams at Cambridge City Council has achieved agreement on a scheme for which planning and listed building consents were granted in 2025.

The proposed scheme would provide step-free access to all public areas of the Sedgwick Museum and to the Department of Earth Sciences by means of a new external passenger lift, landscaping and ground-floor access. The scheme would also make improvements to the congested car parking area to the front of the Sedgwick Building. Internal layouts would be altered to allow access to the proposed lift, and some display cabinets in the Museum would be removed and relocated.

The Planning and Resources Committee has approved a business case to implement this scheme at an estimated cost of £3.6m. The costs will be met principally from the Investment Fund; initial design development was funded by the Minor Works Fund. The work is expected to commence in the spring of 2027 and will take approximately twelve months to complete.

The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 5, p. 693) for the approval of this work.

Austin, Balfour, Cockcroft and Phoenix Buildings

23 July 2026

The following Notice is published to advise the University of works which are not considered to be a 'substantial alteration' within the meaning of Statute F II 3 and therefore do not require a Report but are nevertheless of interest or consequence to members of the Regent House.

A Report recommending the disposal of the freehold of the Mill Lane North site to King's College was published on 30 April 2025. The recommendations of that Report were approved by Grace 2 of 29 May 2025. The Report noted that the usual procedures would be followed for determining whether to notify, or seek approval from, the Regent House regarding any building works required as part of the programme to relocate current occupants of the Mill Lane North site by the end of July 2027. Several relocation projects require works to buildings on the New Museums site as summarised in the following paragraphs.

The Mill Lane North Programme Board has endorsed a proposal to relocate the Department of Land Economy from 17 Mill Lane to space in the Austin and Cockcroft Buildings on the New Museums site.

To facilitate this move, the Department of Zoology has consolidated its use of space in the Austin Building. Further reorganisation of the space assigned to Zoology will enable the relocation of the Office of the School of the Biological Sciences from 17 Mill Lane to the Austin Building. The Department of Zoology's facilities for aquatic research – currently ranged across several buildings on the New Museums site and at Madingley – will be consolidated into a single research facility in the Austin Building. Improvements will be made to the end gable of the Austin Building, which was left in a temporary state following the completion of the Student Services Centre.

Space in the Phoenix Building will be refurbished to accommodate research groups from the School of the Humanities and Social Sciences, also relocated from 17 Mill Lane. A bridge linking the Balfour and Phoenix Buildings will be removed as this no longer provides a suitable means of escape and will be replaced with an external spiral escape stair.

The Programme Board for Education Space has agreed that it would be appropriate to refurbish a vacant area in the Balfour Building as a new venue for teaching and examinations, to be managed alongside the existing education space in the Cockcroft Building. This work is not a direct result of the Mill Lane relocation programme, but the opportunity has been under consideration by the Programme Board for some time and can be achieved most cost effectively if it is undertaken at the same time as the other works itemised in this Notice.

The total estimated cost is £18m. Enabling work commenced during the spring and early summer of 2026; the substantive work to the Austin, Balfour and Cockcroft Buildings is scheduled to commence in August 2026 and conclude in October 2027, although the works necessary to achieve relocations from the Mill Lane site will conclude by July 2027. Planning permission and – where applicable – listed building consent from Cambridge City Council have been achieved.

Regent House membership for retired University staff: 15 August deadline reminder

Under Special Ordinance A (i) (e), retired members of University staff who were previously on the Roll can reacquire Regent House membership (including, for example, those currently working as voluntary Directors of Research). To qualify, University staff:

- will have retired or be about to retire from an office or appointment in the University which previously qualified them for membership of the Regent House; and
- will not be eligible for membership of the Regent House in any other category, e.g. as a Fellow of a College; and
- will need to provide to the Director of Governance and Compliance by 15 August prior to the promulgation of the Roll each year written confirmation from their Head of institution that they are active participants in the University's affairs.

Establishment of an EDSAC Professorship of Computer Science

The General Board has agreed to propose the establishment for a single tenure of an EDSAC Professorship of Computer Science from 1 October 2026, assigned to the Department of Computer Science and Technology. The salary costs of the Professorship will be fully funded by the income from an endowment fund, following a donation (see the Vice-Chancellor's Notice, p. 680). The Chair of the Resource Management Committee approved the funding arrangements for the Professorship for a single tenure on 22 June 2026.

The new Professorship will increase the Department's excellent track record of attracting external funding from the research councils and industry. The General Board has agreed, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Computer Science and Technology and the Council of the School of Technology, that the candidature shall be open to all persons with experience in the general field of the title of the office.

The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 6, p. 693) for the approval of the establishment of the Professorship for a single tenure.

Establishment of a Professorship of Material Culture

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Human, Social and Political Science and the Council of the School of the Humanities and Social Sciences, has agreed to propose the establishment of a Professorship of Material Culture for a single tenure from 1 October 2027, assigned to the Department of Social Anthropology. There will be a joint recruitment exercise to appoint a candidate to the Professorship and the Directorship of the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology. The full salary costs of the Professorship will be met from recurrent resources available to the School. The Chair of the Resource Management Committee approved the funding arrangements for the Professorship on 22 June 2026.

The Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology (MAA) is heavily research active and has a strong international standing amongst other European museums for its sustained commitment to acknowledging indigenous perspectives and its commitment to collaborations in countries throughout Africa, Asia, South and Central America and Oceania (a.k.a. the Global South). Strong academic leadership of the MAA is needed against the backdrop of an increasingly challenging funding landscape. The Professor will be an ambassador for the institution and will provide strategic and diplomatic leadership in engagement with communities, professionals and government representatives from across the Global South, sometimes in relation to high-profile, contested collections and heritage issues. The Professor will also contribute to the organisation and advocacy of the University of Cambridge museums and collections and may contribute to sector engagement and leadership.

The Professor will be expected to lead on fundraising initiatives for the institution, through bids to sector agencies and charities and through work with the University's Development and Alumni Relations team towards securing major gifts.

The General Board has agreed, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Human, Social and Political Science and the Council of the School of the Humanities and Social Sciences, that the candidature shall be open to all persons with experience in the general field of the title of the office.

The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 7, p. 693) for the approval of the establishment of the Professorship for a single tenure.

Retitling of a Professorship

By Grace 3 of 8 August 2007, the Professorship of Veterinary Science was retitled the Professorship of Comparative Pathology. The General Board now recommends that the title of the Professorship is changed back to the Professorship of Veterinary Science from 1 October 2026, on the retirement of the current holder of the Professorship. This is so that the recruitment to the Professorship (and to the Headship of the Department of Veterinary Medicine, as part of a jointly run exercise) attracts the widest possible pool of world-class candidates.

The Council is submitting a Grace (Grace 8, p. 693) to rename the Professorship of Comparative Pathology.

Frank Ramsey Professorship of Economics

The Board of Electors to the Frank Ramsey Professorship of Economics has reported to the General Board that it has been unable to make an election to this Professorship. Under the provisions of Special Ordinance C (vii) B. 16(a)(ii) (*Statutes and Ordinances*, 2024, p. 81, as amended by Grace 1 of 4 February 2026), the Board has discontinued the Professorship until 31 August 2026.

Examination, if more than ninety-six months have elapsed since they began the preclinical medical course, except that
 - (b) no Cambridge Graduate Course student shall be a candidate for any Part of the Final M.B. examination, if
 - (i) more than seventy-two months have elapsed since the date of their admission to Year 1 of the Cambridge Graduate course; or
 - (ii) more than thirty-six months have elapsed since the date of their admission directly to Year 3 of the Cambridge Graduate course.

HAYTER ENDOWMENT FUND

1. The funds received from Cambridge in America, following a donation from Dr Mark Hayter, together with such other sums as may be received or applied for the same purpose, shall form an endowment fund called the Hayter Endowment Fund to support research and education in the Department of Computer Science and Technology.

2. The Managers shall be responsible for the administration of the Fund and the application of its income and shall comprise

- (a) the Head of the Department of Computer Science and Technology, who shall be Chair;
- (b) two members of the Faculty of Computer Science and Technology appointed by the Faculty Board of Computer Science and Technology, who shall serve for such period as the Faculty Board shall determine.

3. Subject to Regulation 4, the income of the Fund shall be applied towards the payment of the stipend, national insurance, pension contributions, and associated indirect costs of a University teaching office in the Department of Computer Science and Technology, and to the provision of postgraduate studentships which are not required to be associated with the officeholder. Any studentship supported by the Fund shall bear the name of Hayter and any office supported by the fund shall bear the name of EDSAC. Arrangements for awards, including the number, tenure and conditions of studentships to be awarded in any given year, the expenses to be covered by an award, and the form of the application and selection processes, shall be at the discretion of the Managers and may provide for applications by persons who are not yet members of the University and for the financial circumstances of candidates to be taken into consideration.

4. Any unexpended income in any financial year, including income accrued during any year in which studentships are not awarded or during a vacancy in any office supported by the Fund, may, at the discretion of the Managers:

- (a) with the approval of the Council of the School of Technology, be applied to support research and education in the Department of Computer Science and Technology in such manner as may be recommended by the Managers;
- (b) be carried forward for use as income in accordance with Regulation 3 in any one or more subsequent financial years.
